

# **What's Happening Saint John**

**February 9, 2022** 

The City of Saint John is pleased to provide the following summary of some of the great news, updates and important information about what's happening in the City.



#### Snow, snow, and more snow!

January certainly came in like a lion and it hasn't stopped since! As always, the City has been working hard to keep our streets, sidewalks and public areas clear of snow, and safe for residents. City departments continue to use to coordinated effort to storm response, often seven days per week, 24 hours per day.



There have been **six** storm events so far in the 2021-2022 winter season:

- Two of the six snowstorms have been more severe than any storms in the previous three winters
- There have been 10 overnight parking bans called so far
- Over **1,500** truck loads of snow have been removed from Saint John streets in the past week alone. This is approximately half the amount of snow that is removed during an entire average winter season!
- 100 cm of snow fell in January 2022 in Saint John. In January 2015, the year of "Snowmaggedon," 135 cm of snow fell that month. We're not far off!

The City's Customer Service Team has been busy answering calls and engaging with the public. They have received 731 snow-related service requests since January 1, in addition to the significant number of storm emails and calls they have received that don't require service.

The City has issued 12 storm-related public news releases, 36 social media posts, and coordinated four radio interviews in response to the storms.

### City launches telephone survey around transportation needs in Saint John

A City-sponsored phone survey has begun to gather input from Saint John residents on community needs with regards to modes of transportation within the city. The survey results will help to support decisions related to transportation infrastructure investments, sustainable development, and healthy communities.

The survey will run from February 8-15. All residents and businesses are encouraged to have their say and participate in the survey if contacted.

## Canadian Armed Forces tested their navigation skills in Rockwood Park

On Sunday, February 6, members of the Canadian Armed Forces tackled the trails of Rockwood Park near the Fisher Lakes area for cold weather navigation skills training. The exercise provided local reservists with an opportunity to train outdoors in challenging winter conditions and put their orienteering skills to the test. The exercise



involved approximately 16 personnel from the Third Field Artillery Regiment and centred around map and compass navigation combined with testing winter survival skills. For details click <u>HERE</u>.

## Mayor showcases City's climate change efforts as guest speaker at federal event

Mayor Donna Reardon recently participated as a guest speaker at an Environment and Climate Change Canada online event after Saint John was chosen as a success story in developing projects through the federal government's Low Carbon Economy Fund (LCEF). The event was held to announce this year's funding to other jurisdictions in Canada.

"As a coastal city, Saint John is acutely aware of the effects of climate change, especially rising sea levels, flooding, and unpredictable weather," said Mayor Reardon during the event. "The Saint John District

Energy System Project and the Municipal Buildings Deep Energy Retrofit Project, funded through the Low Carbon Economy Fund, are an important part of our commitment to net-zero emissions by 2050 and environmental stewardship."

In 2018 the City received partial funding for two environmental projects after applying for federal support under Saint John's Climate Change Action Plan. Since 2019, the Municipal Buildings Deep Energy Retrofit project has led to energy audits of more than 80% of the City's building portfolio, more than \$1 million in infrastructure investments, 645 tonnes of CO2 eliminated as well as over \$150,000 annual energy savings.



Phase one of the Saint John District Energy System Project is underway and once complete, several buildings in the Uptown core will have their heating and cooling needs run through this system. This investment has already seen 256 tonnes of CO2 eliminated from the atmosphere and \$84,000 in energy savings.

Both projects are on track to be completed by end of March 2024. Funding from the LCEF has allowed the City to be strategically positioned to accomplish long-term transformational energy changes in Saint John.

## **Ethnocultural Support Program receiving plenty of interest**

The City of Saint John Ethnocultural Support Program continues to receive a great deal of interest. To date, Latin American group RED LATIN Inc. has successfully incorporated, while Indigenous group Eastern Circle is working through the application process with the assistance of City staff. Local associations from Nigeria, Philippines and Mauritius are also in the process of filling out application forms. Applications and information can be found HERE.
