Public space at Fundy Quay construction has begun

The Fundy Quay development project marked another major milestone with construction now started following several months of preparation along the Saint John waterfront.

Construction equipment and crews have arrived on site and construction activity will be increasing over the coming weeks and months. The start of construction represents an exciting next step in the redesign of the public space at Market Slip and the extension of Harbour Passage.

As part of the initial work plan, the temporary restaurant patios at Market Square are scheduled to be removed beginning October 11, to make way for the construction

of new permanent multi-season patios, which will open in time for next summer's patio season.

The restaurants will remain open for business during the construction period and can easily be accessed through the St. Patrick Street entrance, the entrance across from the Hilton Hotel and through the pedway connections in Brunswick Square.

SJEMO team presented with exemplary service awards

City of Saint John names Brent McGovern as the incoming Chief Administrative Officer

At its meeting on September 26, Common Council voted unanimously to appoint Brent McGovern as the incoming Chief Administrative Officer (CAO), a title currently referred to as City Manager.

Mr. McGovern has had a long and esteemed career with the City of Saint John, since first joining the organization as a municipal design engineer in 2000. Since then, he has held several engineering, director and executive leadership positions.

Mr. McGovern will assume the top municipal position in an acting capacity on December 15, 2022, and permanently following the current City Manager, John Collin's, retirement on January 3, 2023. For more information, click <u>HERE</u>.

City participating in homelessness strategy

The City of Saint John is part of a team of local stakeholders who are assisting with reviewing applications for funding through Infrastructure Canada's Reaching Home: Canada's Homelessness Strategy program.

Reaching Home is a community-based program aimed at preventing and reducing homelessness across Canada. This program provides federal funding to communities (urban, Indigenous, rural, and remote) to help them address their local homelessness needs.

In Saint John, the available federal funds are to be allocated to local non-profits who work to prevent and reduce homelessness. The total amount available through this funding for 2022 and 2023 is \$1,285,336 which is less than the total funding requested through the applications of \$2,093,643.

The application deadline closed on September 2 and the application review committee met on September 20 to begin reviewing funding requests. More information about the program can be found <u>HERE</u>.

City Hall new home to beautifully carved sculpture

City Hall prepared the front entrance to building for the installation of a carved sculpture from Sculpture Saint John on September 15.

One of three sculptures being installed around the City, this highly visible area will allow for residents and visitors to view the sculpture while passing through the uptown area. An official unveiling ceremony is being planned for this fall. More details will be announced once confirmed.

Honouring National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

In honour of National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, the official unveiling of a large-scale mural created by local Inuvialuit artist Cassandra McLaughlin took place at the City Market on September 30. The mural is permanently displayed at the Germain Street entrance to the City Market.

Following the ceremony, the public were encouraged to participate in other events at the Market including viewing the Every Child Matters shadow box created by UNB Saint John's Indigenous Advisor and students, and watch short films and videos to learn about Truth and Reconciliation and its history.

In addition to these events, the City once again provided employees with an opportunity to focus on learning around National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. Daily Truth and Reconciliation moments were sent to all employees throughout the week leading up to September 30 and many employees have completed an online educational module called The Path, an in-depth informative history of Indigenous Peoples in Canada.

City prepares to implement four-day compressed work week and extend customer service hours Following a unanimous vote of approval from Common Council on the City Manager's policy recommendation, the City will implement a four-day compressed work week for most municipal employees effective October 17, 2022.

During his presentation to Council, the City Manager spoke to the many benefits of a four-day work week for employees and the employer and the benefitof extending morning and evening Customer Service Centre and One Stop Development Shop hours for the community, Monday through Thursday.

He added that while the shift will see most municipal offices closed Friday through Sunday, operations such as key services in public works, the City Market, recreation facilities, transit, parking enforcement, Saint John Water and public



safety services will continue to serve the community reliably and without interruption throughout the week.

The Fire Safety Smoke House was on site to educate children and parents on the importance of fire safety and having a plan to escape a fire.
