The City of Saint John is pleased to provide the following summary of some of the great news, updates and important information about what's happening in the City.



First international school in Atlantic Canada, Lycée Français, chooses Saint John

On January 16, Envision Saint John: The Regional Growth Agency was pleased to announce that Saint John has been selected as home to the Lycée International Français des Provinces Atlantiques, an education institute part of the Don Bosco international campus. The international school will be located in Market Square and is set to open its doors to students in September 2024 and is open for registration immediately.

The Lycée International is a global francophone not-for-profit private school model that facilitates international exchanges for students from Europe, Africa and around the globe to study abroad. The Lycée International Français des Provinces Atlantiques will serve international and local students from kindergarten to grade 12 and will be part of a large network of schools around the world.



"The Lycée International Français des Provinces

Atlantiques perfectly aligns with our region's 10-year outcomes," explains Paulette Hicks, CEO of Envision Saint John: The Regional Growth Agency. "Not only will people be moving to New Brunswick and the Saint John Region from all over the world – but our academic cluster is expanding along with our talent pipeline."

The Lycée International Français des Provinces Atlantiques will be established in Market Square, a signature landmark building in uptown Saint John operated by Hardman Group.

"This unique opportunity aligns with the commercial real estate reimagine strategy that is required in today's environment," says Hicks. "Don Bosco was looking for their first Atlantic Canadian campus, and in the spirit of Saint John firsts, we teamed up with the City of Saint John to pitch 'Why Saint John' and are thrilled with today's announcement."

The announcement was made by Mr. Sylvain Olivier, CEO of the Lycée International Français dans les Provinces Atlantiques (LIFPA).

Here we grow: Saint John's population on the rise

It's official - more people are now calling Saint John home. According to data released by Statistics Canada in January, Saint John's population has grown by 2.4 per cent, or 1,759 residents, bringing the City's population to 73,611 as of July 2022. This increase marks the fastest growth the City has experienced in decades, and already exceeds Council's goal of 2 per cent annual population growth set out in the 10-year Strategic Plan.

Overall, the Greater Saint John region welcomed 2,861 people to the area, bringing the total regional

population to 135,622. The region also welcomed 1,208 new immigrants and 586 non-permanent residents, a 416.6 per cent hike from 2021.

"We are so excited to continue to welcome more people to Saint John, and so pleased to be growing our population - again," says Saint John Mayor Donna Reardon. "These numbers validate to us that all of the hard work and effort that has gone into attracting and retaining residents over the past few years is paying off."



The City released its Population Growth Framework in early 2018, which was Saint John's first strategy focused on growing its population. Recently, Council adopted the Succeed and Stay Immigration Strategy which aims to attract 12,000 newcomers to the City over the next 10 years. It promotes the Saint John region as the destination of choice for newcomers and their families in New Brunswick.

Saint John acts on its new Affordable Housing Action Plan with the launch of a grant program to support the creation of new affordable housing supply

At its meeting on January 9, 2023, Saint John Council approved a new Affordable Housing Grant Program aimed at increasing the number of affordable housing units in Saint John. Funding for the grant program has been provided by the Province of New Brunswick's Regional Development Corporation (RDC) through funding received by the Government of Canada's Transit Fund. This federal fund supports municipalities in addressing transit shortfalls and housing supply and affordability.



"Affordable housing and homelessness impacts cities in New Brunswick and across Canada. We need more affordable units, and we are working with our Provincial and Federal partners to create solutions," says Saint John Mayor Donna Reardon. "The Affordable Housing Grant Program will directly support the construction of new affordable housing units for residents of Saint John. We are pleased to launch this grant program and to help address housing affordability in our city."

Government taking action on gun crime in Saint John and the Kennebecasis Region with up to \$1.79 million for prevention programs

On behalf of the Government of Canada

People in New Brunswick and across Canada deserve to feel safe in their communities.

That's why the Government of Canada is taking action with a comprehensive plan that gets guns off our streets and puts more resources into our communities. An important element of this work is stopping violence before it starts, which is why the government launched the \$250 million Building Safer Communities Fund (BSCF). First announced in March 2022, the BSCF supports local initiatives that prevent gun and gang violence and help young people make good choices.

On January 25, Wayne Long, Member of Parliament for Saint John–Rothesay, on behalf of the Honourable Marco Mendicino, Minister of Public Safety, announced that the City of Saint John will receive up to \$972,992 and the Kennebecasis Region will receive up to \$824,018, totalling up to \$1.79 million from the BSCF to prevent gun crime and gang violence in the city. This funding will help address the underlying conditions that give rise to crime. It will support community-led projects to prevent violence among young people who are involved in gangs, or at risk of joining them – helping them set themselves up for success in life.


